Allotments: Extremely valuable – grossly underestimated – shockingly unknown

The image of allotments is perhaps not always positive. A first impression may be misleading. A simplified image underestimates too often the value of the allotment movement.

In reality the allotments are in many ways valuable for society, nature, environment and for the personal development.

and of course you have to warn for some dangers of such an area.




The allotment Stadspark in Groningen – Netherlands – built an observation shelter towards an area with interesting birds.




On the same allotment they made an effort in giving information about nut and fruit trees – everybody is allowed to eat of their fruit.



The allotment site Eigen Arbeid in the Hague (Netherlands) gives much attention to the harmony with the surrounding nature.




Many times people can hardly believe that this is on an allotment.
